Unchecked Development in Santa Rosa County

When my husband and I moved to the Wallace community in 1999, it was rural. We were surrounded by cotton fields. Now the five points area has exploded. A Piggly Wiggly and new school are going in at Wallace Lake Drive and Chumuckla Highway to our south. North Diamond, Foxboro Estates and Tamrell Forest subdivisions to our west, and multiple other subdivisions on Chumuckla Highway, Woodbine Road and West Spencer Field Rd. I saw a deer on my road for the first time in 23 years. The wildlife is being flushed out and forced into areas where they can be killed. The county has let all this happen well behind the infrastructure changes needed to support this growth. The roads are still two way with only turn lanes. Already the traffic increase is at least doubled or tripled. On top of all this growth that has happened in the past 10 years or so, they're moving forward with the Jubilee Project. This is a massive undertaking that was derailed during the recession. The plan includes about 260 homes on 260 acres. plus schools, shopping and dining areas and a medical park.

Local residents are pushing back, citing that the area is zoned agricultural. Right now, the phase one proposal in with the county's planning department. Traffic is bad already, and will only get worse. Local residents are frustrated and angry because most moved out here for a quiet lifestyle and lack of congestion. Many are selling and moving further north. The infrastructure here is not ready for such a massive project. If you live in the five points area, or north to Willard Norris road, call your commissioners and let them know how you feel. Those of us that have been here for years and the wildlife in this area must be considered.

Not only will this proposal have adverse impacts to the land and water, but it will also cause potential harm to variety of species that inhabit the river such as the Gulf Sturgeon.

For those of you that have enjoyed the river, you know that parts of the river is home to "one of the largest contiguous longleaf pine/wiregrass ecosystem remaining in the world, right along our river" as well.


